Prayer Concerns


Trusting in God's presence, grace, healing, and care, we pray . . .

- 191,182 Gifts of the Heart Kits and Blankets distributed



Malawi after Cyclone Freddy - How We Can Help

Earlier this month Cyclone Freddy struck the southern part of Malawi, killing hundreds and wiping out basic support systems for thousands of people, including homes, latrines, crops, roads and bridges.

The storm first struck Madagascar in late February then southern Mozambique and continued to Malawi with continued torrential rains, damaging winds, floods, and mudslides. As has been highlighted on the internet and in the news, the damage and loss have impacted thousands. We invite you to consider donating special funds to provide direct support from our congregation for our partners in Malawi. Our Malawi Partnership will serve as a conduit directly to Dr. Arie Glas, medical director of Mulanje Presbyterian Mission Hospital. Arie has requested that our funds go to support the hospital's highly

successful Sustain-able Livelihoods Program (SLP), which BPC has supported for ten years. Alongside the hospital's health promotion outreach (the service area includes approximately 700,000 people), the SLP supports numerous activities aimed at enhanced food crop production, improved agricultural techniques (such as small-scale irrigation) and tree planting, animal husbandry, and income-producing activities such as bee keeping, milk sales, small livestock development, nutrition, etc. Our donations would assist with the recovery of these programs.

To contribute to this special need, you may write a check to BPC and write Malawi Partnership 4200.1 on the memo line, and send it to the church office or place in the offering plate. A member of the Malawi Partnership will match total individual contributions up to \$1,000.

In addition, you may send your donations through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, which is helping out more broadly in all the countries impacted by Cyclone Freddy. Send contributions to the church office or place in the offering box with the designation "PDA DR000158--Southern Africa Countries" in the memo line on your check. CEDEPCA:

A Year of Challenges, Adaptation, and Recovery

2022 was a year of recovery for the staff of CEDEPCA. In the summary of the year, Judith Castenada, the executive director writes, "This year, 2022, was a recovery year for each one of our programs. It was a year of challenges and adaptation in the educational processes that we held, and also a year of recovering the health of many of our students, teachers and staff." It was a year of challenges and of learning to do ministry in a new way. And yet, in the midst of all of this, their ability to minister to the people of Guatemala was remarkable. In the past year, 5,495 people were served through their humanitarian aid programs, workshops, virtual journeys and classes. 2,793 people received humanitarian aid through water filters, seed kits, egg laying chickens, small entrepreneurship and psychosocial and pastoral accompaniment. 7,702 people participated in different courses, workshops, talks and virtual journeys.

Through our partnership with CEDEPCA, we are able to bring the love and justice of God to the people of Guatemala. Peaks Presbytery will be taking another delegation to Guatemala in April through CEDEPCA's Intercultural Encounters Program. Beth Mattson from BPC will be joining this delegation. They would be happy to share what they experience when they return.

THE TIME IS NOW TO CHERISH CREATION

Two earth care items are coalescing this April:

The **first** is processing the dismaying dire report from the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. The **Synthesis Report** can be found here: cleantechnica.com/2023/03/21/the-ipcc-synthesis-report-is-out-it-offers-a-faint-glimmer-of-hope/, and a 3-minute video about it can be found here: www.youtube.com/watch?v=T9CeECpxtx8

In the words of UN Secretary-General António Guterres, "This Report is a clarion call to massively fast track climate efforts by every country and every sector and on every time frame. In short, our world needs climate action on all fronts—EVERYTHING, EVERYWHERE, ALL AT ONCE! The transition must cover the entire economy. Partial pledges won't cut it. The climate time-bomb is ticking." and in the words of Katharine Hayhoe, Christian and Climate Scientist of the Nature Conservancy, "If we have the will to do so, we can accomplish it. The problem we have today, though, is, we still, many of us, don't really understand how this issue affects us here and now. And we don't understand that the majority of the solutions we need are already in our hands . . . The only question at this point is, what are we waiting for?"

The **second item** is that **April is Earth Month, culminating in Earth Day on April 22**. Look in your *Midweek* updates for Earth Month and Earth Day actions you can take.

The PCUSA General Assembly overture approved in 2022 calls on the church to take a variety of actions which truly make a difference, summarized in a letter from Bruce Gillette, the moderator of Presbyterians for Earth Care:

1. Repent of our role in driving the "planetary ecosystem to the tipping point of unsustainability for humans and mass extinction of other species."
2. Direct that all financial investments of the PC(USA) be withdrawn from industries that contribute to the production of the two major greenhouse gasses (CO₂ and methane). Our denomination is doing this now, and is encouraging congregations to take similar action.
3. Direct the Board of Pensions and the Presbyterian Foundation to increase investment in sources of low-carbon renewable energy, energy efficiency, and energy storage, and sensitively support "policies that transition workers in our present fossil fuel industry into employment in green and sustainable energy sectors."
4. Members and congregations are encouraged to study past GA papers and current overtures. To start, look at one of the 2022 overtures at www.pc-biz.org/#/ by typing into the Search "investing in a green future."
5. Churches, educational institutions and individuals are urged to "walk the talk" by doing "the needed, faithful change we seek by being carbon neutral, net-zero, or even climate positive by 2030."
6. Our advocacy offices (in DC and UN) are called to work in partnership with ecumenical and international groups, to "assist economically developing and emerging countries* with carbon use mitigation and adaptation."
7. Recognize "climate debt" - the debt said to be owed to developing countries by developed countries for the damage caused by their disproportionately large contributions to climate change.
8. Support the carbon dividend (as the 2018 GA did). Check out the Citizen's Climate Lobby at citizensclimatelobby.org/ of which we have a local chapter.
