

Transgender Day of Remembrance

The Transgender Day of Remembrance is on November 20. It began in 1999 to memorialize the murders of two Black transgender women, Rita Hester and Chanelle Pickett. It is now observed in more than twenty countries and recognizes the names of transgender and gender non-conforming people who have been killed in the previous year.



If you love someone who is transgender or gender non-conforming, this can be an important day to reach out and remind them how valuable and beautiful they are.

November is the month to renew or begin your commitment to Cents-Ability!

What is Cents-Ability? Cents-Ability is one way that families, congregations, and presbyteries can support the battle against hunger and poverty. Every member is invited to contribute a few cents at every meal. Funds are then used to support local, national and international hunger ministries.

Why should I participate in Cents-Ability? This simple act is a small first step in the battle against hunger and poverty, and an expression of thanks for what we have received. It is also a commitment to share with others in response to Jesus' command "You give them something to eat." Our gifts can add up: at a nickel a meal, a congregation of 100 persons can offer \$2,160 dollars a year. A 30,000-member presbytery has the potential of raising over \$1.6 million annually!



How do you participate in the Cents-Ability Offering? Each family member - any age - is invited to contribute a predetermined amount (2 cents, 5 cents, 10 cents) at each meal. They may wish to contribute the combined amount at dinner, or whenever the whole family is together. The emphasis on daily participation by each member of the household builds awareness that we all are capable of, and responsible for, helping. Daily participation emphasizes that hunger is a daily problem; people who are hungry do not get a break! Coins can be taken to worship on the third Sunday, or coins can be "recycled." After making a contribution each month through the BPC "Give" page or in the marked pew envelopes, the coins can be reused. Each household is also encouraged to live out their commitment by finding additional ways to make a difference for people who are hungry in the community and/or around the world.

How is our gift used? 45% of the Cents-Ability offering is awarded through grants to local organizations and agencies, and 45% is awarded to regional, national and international organizations and agencies. All grant recipients must address hunger through one or more of the following five Presbyterian Hunger Program areas of emphasis:

- ◆ direct food relief
- ◆ development assistance
- ◆ public policy advocacy
- ◆ hunger education
- ◆ lifestyle integrity

What action do I take next? Our Cents-Ability offering is ordinarily received on the third Sunday of each month; however, this November we will receive it on the **second Sunday, November 12**, so we can focus on renewing our commitment in the worship service.

Presbyterian Women and the Alternative Gift Giving Fair

Each year, for over five years, the organization of Presbyterian Women (PW) at BPC has offered an Alternative Gift Giving Fair during the Advent Festival. The fair has been in response to a rising number of people who wish to make a donation to a charitable organization either in honor of someone, or in memory of someone, in lieu of buying a material gift for that person during the Christmas holidays.

The organizations presented for alternative gift giving by PW are very rarely all the same every year. The criteria considered involves, specifically, the current year need—sometimes simply programs and projects in progress. However, the funding the organization receives from the church budget and PW also plays a role in the decision. In addition, local, regional, and worldwide organizations, mission connections, as well as categories of people (low-income families, children, college students, refugees), are a factor. PW limits the number of organizations offered for the Alternative Gift Giving experience to ensure each organization receives as much funding as possible. Donors receive a card with an envelope to mail to each honoree or to the person being informed of a memorial gift.

The annual Alternative Gift Giving Fair will be held on December 3 at BPC's Advent Festival. Watch for more information as Advent approaches and join this unique event! Your support of the organizations being showcased this Advent season will not only assist you with your Christmas shopping but also provide much needed funding that will go a long way in helping others.

A Message from Cobbie and Dessa Palm

Dear friends,

We in the Philippines have now just crossed over the one-year mark of having witnessed the unexpected return of the son of the late Ferdinand and Imelda Marcos to the highest elected office of government. It did not seem in the remotest way possible that a direct descendant bearing the same name as the father could ever return to power after the horrific political, economic, and social trauma left by the Marcos legacy. But then again, the world appears to be playing by rapidly changing rules in the way that minds are molded and shaped in the world today.

Many have pointed to a continuing deficit in the opportunity to access education and develop the facility to think critically. A World Bank report in 2022 has shown that the Philippines has a learning poverty rate of 91 percent which is among the highest rates in Southeast Asia and the Pacific. A learning poverty rate is determined by the number of 10-year-old pupils who cannot read and understand age-

appropriate texts or written materials as a result of deficient learning opportunities. *(photo: As disinformation spreads destroying the hopes of the Peace Talks, the gathering of church people to advocate for its resumption has become tenuous.)*



A recent study on the Philippine midterm elections [showed] the involvement of powerful influencer accounts across [social] platforms during the 2022 election season. They have been shown to work beyond just positively promoting a candidate to stepping into uncharted territory aimed at manipulating public opinion through a coordinated spread of biased messages, false information, and attacks on opponents or even toward persons posting dissenting comments.

As Peace Advocates seeking the resumption of the Peace Talks between the Philippine Government and the National Democratic Front in the Philippines (NDFP), [we] have witnessed the disinformation that has rapidly spread which has even made it difficult for us to advance the Peace Process. The equation has now simply become, "To support the Peace Process with the NDFP is to support terrorism." The manipulation of public opinion has spread far and wide with alarming ease.

The words of the Apostle Paul sound a relevant call to us who immerse ourselves in the ministry of advocating ways to peace that are not in the interest of the powers and principalities around us: *Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect.* (Roman 12:2)

Our ministries flourish and survive because there are individuals like yourself who recognize the struggle of correcting historical revisionism and upholding fact over persuasive disinformation. Your prayers, your words of encouragement, and your generous commitment to giving us hope in difficult times are a lifeline that empowers us to carry on.

Plastic Bag and Film Recycling - The Goal is Not the Benches!

Many of you participate in our program for recycling plastic bags and film. We are grateful for your participation and especially grateful that most of you know how to keep your donations uncontaminated, which is important for Trex, and a true time-saver for those of us who gather it, weigh it, and deliver it to Food Lion. Thank you!



However, it may sound counterintuitive to you that our goal for doing this is not to get benches as a reward (even though we have received 9 benches now), or even to maximize the pounds we collect. Our goal is to REDUCE waste!

For those plastic bags and films which we cannot avoid acquiring, which is still a LOT of plastic, we want to recycle it into a form where it can be re-used and stays out of the landfill. We think Trex does a good job with that, and if we sort it correctly before we deliver it to Food Lion, we believe that most of it gets turned into benches and railings and decks made out of Trex's composite material.

Nonetheless, we wish to remind you (and you can remind your friends if they participate as well), in dealing with plastic film:

- Step 1 is REFUSE IT - this means carry your own bag, take items to your car without a bag, prioritize your purchases from companies that ship in boxes or paper, buy in bulk, cover your leftovers in reusable materials, etc. etc.
- Step 2 is REUSE IT - What can your plastic bag be used for prior to being recycled? Admittedly, however, much of it is too flimsy to reuse more than a time or two.
- Step 3 is RECYCLE IT - Recycling with our Trex program is much better than putting it in the trash. Most of you know how to tell the correct kind of plastic film (#1 and #2 polyethylene), but remember a few other no-no's for your collection.

Please do not include the following:

- Biodegradable or compostable bags. When mixed with other bags, the additives used in these bags can contaminate the new products.
- Plastic bags used for packaged frozen foods, which contain food preservatives that contaminate the other recyclable bags in the batch.
- Bags that aren't completely dry: The water interferes with proper processing.
- Bags that aren't completely free of food residue or other contaminants
